AIMS

To establish networks of events in which Stockton Looked After Children can come together through their Primary Schools

To collect the views of these Looked After Children Young People around a range of issues that affect them

End of Year 2016 - 2017 Report

Pupil Voice

Section 176 of the Education Act 2002 requires Local Authorities and schools to have regard to any guidance given by the Secretary of State about consultation with pupils in connection with the taking of decisions which affect them.

The 2014 Statutory Guidance paper entitled **Listening to and involving children and young people**, recognises that whilst the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child has not been incorporated into national law, the Government reiterates its commitment to pay 'due regard' to the convention when new policy is made and legislation proposed. Through this, the Government strongly encourages Schools and Local Authorities to also pay due regard to the convention.

Article 12 of the United Nations Coventions on the Rights of the Child states

- 1. Parties shall assure to the child who is capable of forming his or her own views the right to express those views freely in all matters affecting the child, the views of the child being given due weight in accordance with the age and maturity of the child.
- 2. For this purpose, the child shall, in particular, be provided the opportunity to be heard in any judicial and administrative proceedings affecting the child, either directly, or through a representative or an appropriate body, in a manner consistent with the procedural rules of national law.

The Statutory Guidance states that 'Pupil Voice' refers to ways of listening to the views of pupils and/or involving them in decision-making.

And that the Government believes that children and young people should have opportunities to express their opinion in matters that affect their lives.

The guidance recognises that one of the benefits of involving children and young people in decision making is:

It contributes to achievement and attainment – young people involved in participative work benefit in a range of different ways. Increased confidence, self- respect, competence and an improved sense of responsibility have all been reported by young people who contribute in school. Schools also report increased motivation and engagement with learning.

The guidance also reminds us that a feature of effective leadership is engaging pupils as active participants in their education and in making a positive contribution to their school and local community.

Summary of Hub Activities during Academic Year 2016 – 2017

In September 2016, the newly appointed EDA LACYP was requested to initiate and lead a project that would support the Local Authority in collecting Primary Looked After Pupil Voice.

During the Autumn Term, Designated Teacher colleagues were asked to volunteer for the role of Hub Champions to support the EDA in the role out of Activity sessions for which Key Stage Looked After Children would come together. Three Champions were recruited:- one for the North Hub (Billingham area), one for Central Hub (schools located close to town) and one for South Hub (Thornaby, Ingleby Barwick area).

In the Autumn Term, three half day Hub Activities were held around the theme of Christmas, one session in each of the Hubs. Pupil voice was collected through a variety of ways, one questionnaire and a thought cloud sheet.

In the Spring Term, two half day Hub Activities were held in the North and Central Hubs around the theme of Easter. Pupil voice was collected through a questionnaire which the pupils completed. Due to unforeseen circumstances a session was not held in South Hub.

In the Summer Term, a bespoke trip was held for the North Hub to Roseberry Topping. This trip was in response to Pupil Voice. Pupil voice was collected through a proforma devised to suit the trip.

A second Hub event was held to which all Schools and Pupils were invited. This event was the result of the EDAs successful application to Booktrust to hold an Author Event. The event took place at Preston Park Museum, with the Children's Author John Dougherty's visit and a free book for each child funded by Booktrust. Pupil voice was collected through a proforma devised by the EDA LACYP.

In total, seven Hub activity sessions took place during the year for Stockton KS2 Looked After Pupils. These sessions were organised and led by the EDA LACYP who was supported by the Hub Champions and other Stockton Colleagues. Pupil voice was collected and the MOMO App was promoted at all of the events.

Participation in Hub Activities during Academic Year 2016 – 2017

In total twenty four of the thirty four eligible schools participated in at least one Hub activity during the year. This equates to 71%

In total fifty five of the eligible seventy pupils participated in at least one Hub activity during the year. This equates to 71%.

There were overwhelmingly positive responses to the questions set in the questionnaire:-

All the children 100% answered yes to the following questions Do you get the right type of help to make sure you are happy and have friends? Do you feel safe and secure at school and home?

38 of the 39 pupils (97%) answered yes to the following questions

Do you feel you have adults who care about you? Do you feel you have adults that you can trust? Do you have adults who you can talk to about the things that are important to you? Do you think the adults listen to what you have to say? Do you think you get the right amount of help with your learning? Do the adults make sure you get enough fun activities to do? Do you know who to talk to if you are unhappy about something?

37 of the 39 children (94%) answered yes to the following question

Do you feel your opinion matters when there is a meeting about you?



Next steps Academic Year 2017 – 2018

The Hub activities have provided the Local Authority with a wealth of Primary Pupil Voice.

So what next?

The EDA LACYP feels this report needs to be shared with the Designated Teachers in the Autumn term 2017, in order to reinforce their duty to ensure that Pupil Voice is high priority on an individual basis through the PEP and LAR meetings and paperwork.

The EDA feels that the young people should receive some feedback on their opinions and views that were collected during the year and that they should be consulted on the continuation of the Primary Hub Activity sessions.

Should it be decided that the Primary Hub Project continue next year, the EDA would propose that the project is underpinned with the focus on empowering the pupils to have their voice heard.

This would enable the project to collect data around pupil attendance at PEP and LAR meetings, look at evidence for how pupil voice influences educational provision and support and would also link with the work of the Lets Take Action Group and an idea around a Creative Writing project, sparked by the poem written during the Summer Author Event.
